PLOT TO ASSASSINATE THE DICTATOR DISCOVERED JUST IN TIME CAUSE POLICE LOSE

### WILSON TO LET BARS DOWN

Reported President Will Soon Sign Proclamation Permitting Rebels to Purchase Arms and Ammunition in the United States

Mexico City, Jan. 27.—Many members of the city police force were dismissed today on orders from General Huerta, following the discovery of a plot to assassinate Huerta next Sunday.

Colonel Irujo, chief of police, and Colonel Zavala, the alleged heads of the conspiracy, were arrested to day and placed under guard at a fortress in Vera Cruz.

The discovery of the plot will result in the complete reorganization of the police force. The plot was revealed by a brother-in-law of one of the policemen.

**Arms for Rebels**  
Washington, Jan. 27.—The downfall of Huerta domination in Mexico is believed by officials here to be in sight today. It is known President Wilson intends to raise the embargo on arms for the rebels within a few days.

The order already for his signature and arms and ammunition will be hurriedly sent across the border to Cuba. The rebels are expected to double their force, as they have had men but not equipment.

**Why Wilson Acted**  
Washington, Jan. 27.—It was learned today that secret information revealing worse conditions in Mexico than had been realized, was given members of the cabinet last night by President Wilson when he informed the cabinet members he intended raising the embargo arms for the rebels. Secret service men have found rebels controlling wide territory and have surprised strength.

**Battleship at Vera Cruz**  
Washington, Jan. 27.—The battleship Minnesota with 400 marines aboard arrived at Vera Cruz today according to navy department dispatches.

**Good Winter in West**  
Pueblo, Colo., Jan. 27.—Nature has been kinder to the mountaineers in northwestern South Dakota this season. Up to January 23, the lowest thermometer had dropped to a temperature below zero, but only upon rare occasions. Livestock on the range is wintering in fine shape and there is a general feeling of optimism throughout the homestead country.

**Woman Tried for Murder**  
Augusta Agnes Edwards on trial at New Orleans for killing George W. Riehl.

Indianapolis, Jan. 27.—Aid for striking copper miners was again sought by the American Federation of Labor when a committee of the United States Mine Workers urged in telegrams to Samuel Gompers that the federation assist all unions for by their aid the miners tomorrow.

**Fast Mail Trains Missing**  
Sante Fe train is in midst of flood-stricken district and can't be heard from.

San Francisco, Jan. 27.—Santa Fe train No. 19, a fast Chicago mail train, has been missing in the flood-stricken San Gabriel valley near Santa Barbara, according to advices received here by railroads. The mail train, carrying 100 passengers, was last reported near Azusa, in the center of the flood district, when the wires went down and nothing has been heard since.

**Damages Collectable Once**  
Statute in Decision in Chapter 215 Session Laws of 1907, Providing Double Damages by Fire in Case Railroads Fail to Settle in Sixty Days

Word has been received in this city that the United States supreme court has declared that the state statute requiring the payment of double damages in certain contingencies, is unconstitutional. The decision was handed by Justice Holmes of the supreme court in the case of the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad against J. F. Post. The statute involved in the decision is chapter 215 of the state session laws of 1907 and known as the double damage fire law.

The case was started in 1908 by J. F. Post of Plankinton, when the plaintiff brought action against the Milwaukee to recover damages for a fire loss on his land in March of that year. In his claim to the railroad, Post demanded \$838 damages as the result of a fire started on his farm by a Milwaukee engine. The Milwaukee offered to settle within sixty days, as required by law, for the amount of \$500, but this was refused by the plaintiff and he brought suit for \$1,676, under the double indemnity law.

The case came to trial and was heard by Justice J. S. Smith. The jury in the case brought in a verdict for the plaintiff of \$180 and costs. This verdict was "doubled" under the law of the state. The Milwaukee appealed to the supreme court of South Dakota and the court affirmed the judgment of the lower court. In October, 1911, the company sued out a writ of error to the United States supreme court on the ground that the statute was in direct violation of the federal constitution in that it was discriminatory and confiscatory, the ground contended, throughout the trial of the action by the federal court.

**Porter Argued Case**  
The decision, in the opinion of the railroad attorneys, will knock out of the South Dakota statute covering double damage by fire and also the statute pertaining to double damages in the loss of livestock. The Milwaukee railroad was the only road in the state to take this matter up and obtain a decision. It was argued before the supreme court of the United States by the attorney W. G. Porter on January 16 in Washington, D. C. The briefs in the case were prepared in the legal department of the Milwaukee in this city.

Justice Holmes, who announced the judgment, said that the Post case was governed by a previous decision in a case of the St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern railroad vs. Wynne, which originated in Arkansas. In the latter the court held that a state statute which allowed a double penalty to the non-payment of extravagant demands denies the due process of law guaranteed by the fourteenth amendment of the constitution. The statute of Arkansas providing that railroad companies must pay claims for livestock killed or injured by their trains, was held to be in violation of the constitution. The amount originally demanded, as construed by the supreme court of that state, was unconstitutional, a denial of due process of law under the fourth amendment.

WOMEN OF ST. PAUL UNDER FLOOD TO TRIAL OF FORMER POLICE HEAD

St. Paul, Jan. 27.—Women of the underworld locked to the county court house today for the opening session of the trial of Martin Flanagan, former chief of police, and Fred Turner, former city detective, charged with extorting money from keepers of disorderly houses, to the extent of \$100,000.

County Attorney O'Brien outlined the case this morning, declaring the state would prove Flanagan ordered Willis Wolf, a police go between, to arrange a meeting with the red-light women and arrange for the payment of graft money.

The meeting was held about December 18, 1912, and a plan arranged whereby the defendants paid money into a ring composed of four members. The state claims protection was never given the houses.

**UNLAWFUL REBATES ARE CHARGED**  
INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION FINDS NUMBER OF RAILROADS HAVE BEEN GUILTY

Washington, Jan. 27.—The railroads are guilty of unlawful rebating if they grant special allowances to private short lines of railroads belonging to industries to which the goods are consigned, or if they perform these rebates on these short lines without additional charge, according to a decision of the interstate commerce commission today.

The commission also served notice on the railroads that before it will consider granting increased freight rates, it will first determine if they are carrying a reasonable contribution for every service they perform and that even with this full taxation that their revenues are shrinking.

**TELEGRAPH OPERATORS ARE PLANNING STRIKE**  
Cleveland, O., Jan. 27.—Two thousand five hundred telegraph operators in a traveling orchestra and station agents on the Lake Shore and Big Four railroads today began voting on the question of declaring a strike for higher wages and better working conditions. The vote will be completed in two weeks.

**NEGRO LYNCHED IN OKLAHOMA**  
NEGRO WHO SHOT MAN WHO HAD BUT LITTLE MONEY, IS HANGED

Oklahoma City, Okla., Jan. 27.—Ben Dickerson, a negro, who robbed W. A. Griffin, a traveling salesman here Sunday evening, was lynched near Nobby, twenty-five miles north, at daylight today. A party in six automobiles, a traveling salesman and a party of men, were empowered the faller of the county jail at Purcell, where Dickerson had been taken, and took him nine miles north to Nobby.

Dickerson shot Griffin in anger when he only had \$1 when held up. Griffin was the local manager for a cereal company.

**COLESUMER GIRL TRIES TO END HER LIFE**  
FEARFULLY MANGLED, GIRL IS SLOWLY DYING IN A HOSPITAL IN NEW YORK CITY—COULD STAND LONELINESS NO LONGER

New York, Jan. 27.—Mary Lucas, a young factory girl attempted suicide this morning before scores of working girls. She was despondent from loneliness.

The girl tried to jump from the fifth story of a factory window, when Helen Britto caught with her, but the Lucas girl finally jerked away and jumped to the roof, two stories below, breaking both legs. She then dragged herself to the edge and dropped half a story to another roof, and then dragged herself to the edge again, while the factory girls looked in the windows, and dropped three stories to the pavement. She is at the point of death in a hospital, praying that her agony may end.

**JOHNSON GETS ONE YEAR IN PEN**  
ABERDEEN MAN IMPLICATED IN MINA GARD ROBBERY WAS SENTENCED TODAY

Ipswich, Jan. 27.—Clarence Johnson of Aberdeen, who recently escaped from the state penitentiary for burglarizing the Farmers' State bank at Mina before Judge Bottum, was brought into court this morning and sentenced to serve one year at the penitentiary at Sioux Falls. Mrs. Johnson was present in the court room and fainted away on hearing sentence pronounced upon her husband. She was carried from the court room by friends.

The court stated before pronouncing sentence that in view of the testimonials of the previous good character of the defendant it was hard for the court to pronounce such a sentence upon him, but that the law demanded that he do so.

**BOB FITZSIMMONS BARRED FROM N. Y.**

**OPIMUM SMUGGLING**  
NEW ORLEANS, JAN. 27.—Owing to the large number of steamships arriving at this port at this time of year, the United States customs inspectors are having great difficulty in preventing the smuggling of opium. Many of the vessels are arriving from the Orient and considerable quantities of the contraband drug have been seized. In one recent case the Chinese members of the crew of the "Hillside" were arrested and the opium inspectors on the wharves and it required the service of the strong arm of the law before the riot could be quelled.
